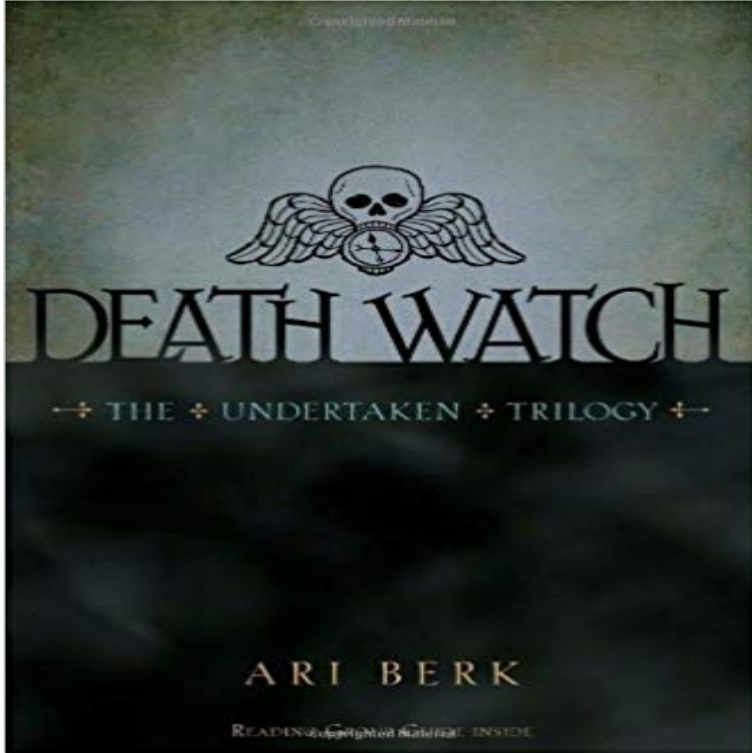


Death Watch (The Undertaken Trilogy)
