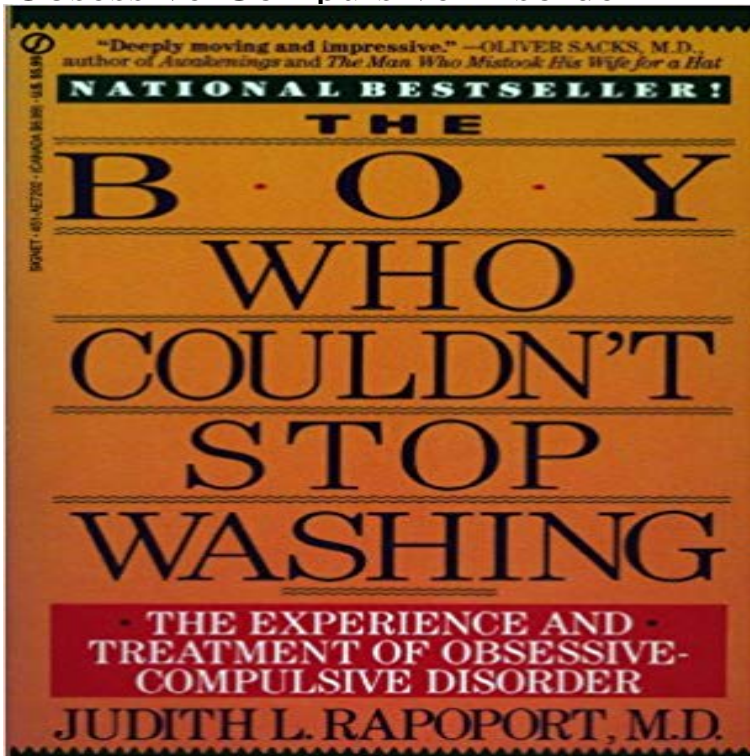


# The Boy Who Couldn't Stop Washing: The Experience and Treatment of Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder
