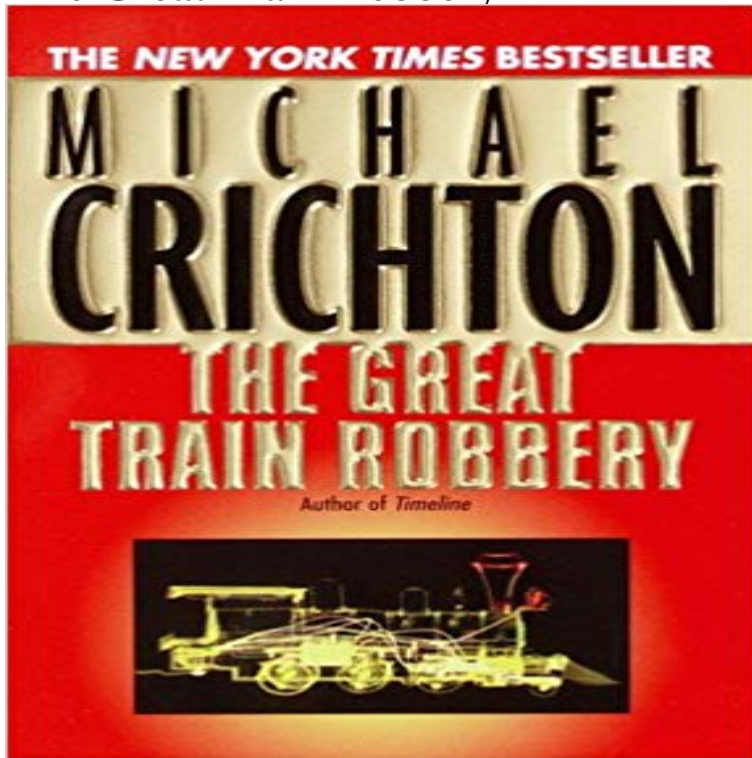


# The Great Train Robbery
