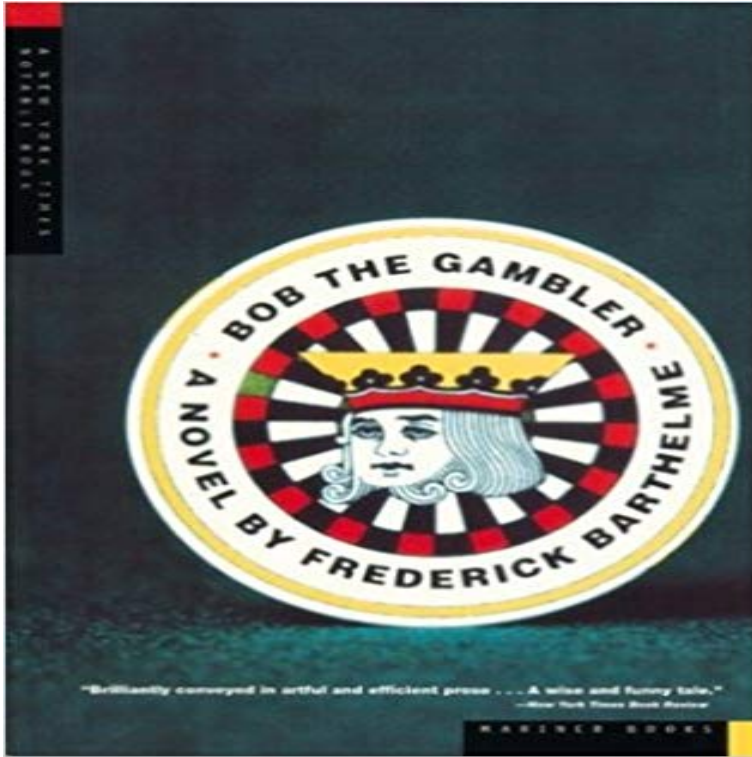


Bob the Gambler
