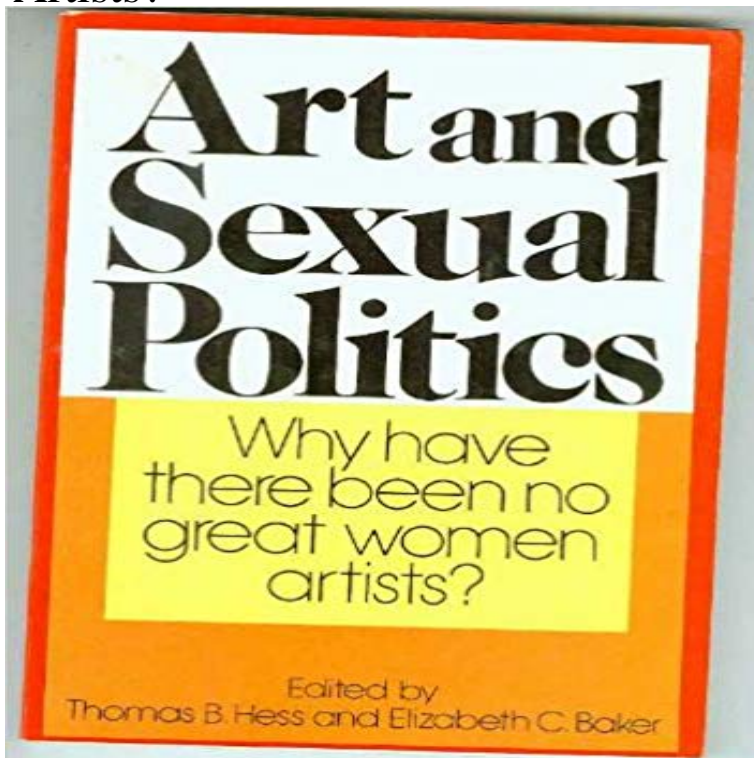


Art and Sexual Politics: Why Have There Been No Great Women Artists?
